Alert Level 2

Ngā Mihi koutou whānau - you are brilliant! In respect of the Alert Level 2 measures we have in place, you are outstanding with your understanding and following of these, ngā mihi! A reminder of our measures:

<u>HEALTH/HAUORA CURRICULUM CONSULTATION</u> (read on to go in the draw for an \$80 Countdown voucher!!) Why are we consulting?

All schools must consult with their communities with regards to the teaching of the Health/Hauora Curriculum act least every two years. This is mandated in Section 91 of the Education and Training Act 2020, which outlines the legal requirements for schools to undertake consultation.

Through consultation, Boards of Trustees are required to produce a written statement about how the school will implement health education, for the community to understand and agree to. As per legislation, schools are required to:

- inform the school community about the content of the health education components of the curriculum.
- consult with members of the school community regarding the way in which the school should implement health education
- describe, in broad terms, the health education needs of the school's students

Our consultation consists of three parts:

- 1. Draft Health Education Statement (for approval)
- 2. Feedback on the Health Programmes at Central Normal School/Te Kura Tuatahi o Papaioea
- 3. Areas that are going well and possible considerations

What is the Health Curriculum?

The New Zealand Curriculum and Te Marautanga o Aotearoa have four strands for the Health and Physical/Hauora Curriculum:

- 1. Personal Health and Physical Development
- in which students develop the knowledge, understanding, skills and attitudes that they need in order to maintain and enhance their personal wellbeing and physical development
- 2. Movement Concepts and Motor Skills
- in which students develop motor skills, knowledge and understandings about movements and positive attitudes towards physical safety
- 3. Relationships with other people
- in which students develop understandings, skills and attitudes that enhance their interactions and relationships with others
- 4. Healthy Communities and Environments
- in which students contribute to healthy communities and environments by taking responsible and critical action

The following shows the four strands that are related to the Health/Hauora Curriculum and the overview of programmes we teach at our kura:

^{**} Sexuality Education is a lifelong process. It provides students with the knowledge, understanding and skills to develop positive attitudes towards sexuality, to take care of their sexual health, and to enhance their interpersonal relationships. In this curriculum, the term sexuality education includes relevant aspects of the concept of hauora, the process of health promotion, understanding social, emotional and physical wellbeing and understand pubertal change. Sexuality Education (S NOT 'sex education', which generally refers only to the physical dimension of sexuality education.

Draft Health/Hauora Curriculum Statement

Below are 2 different Health Curriculum Statements. All schools must have a Health Curriculum Statement, which provide an overview and description of their approach to teaching health. The Statement should be easy to read and succinct - not full of words none of us understand! We ask you to select the statement that sounds best to you.

- Health and Physical Education/Hauora is one of eight essential learning areas of the New Zealand Curriculum and Te Marautanga of Aotearoa.
 - With health education, the focus is on the wellbeing of students themselves, of other people and of society, through learning heath related contexts. Through these contexts of learning, students build a deeper understanding and awareness of the four key learning areas of health: mental health, sexuality education, food and nutrition and body care and personal safety.
 - At Central Normal School/Te Kura Tuatahi o Papaioea, we plan and deliver a range of programmes which promote and wellbeing, affirms children's uniqueness, self confidence and hauora and celebrates cultural diversity and richness. Alongside these programmes, we may also deliver one-off programmes, aimed at supporting a current issue or need, to build students understanding, knowledge and awareness.
 - Supporting the health curriculum, are our school values and dispositions, which are interwoven into our programmes.
 - Health Education is an integral part of our school curriculum and we aim to provide a balanced, informed and empathetic approach to promote health and wellbeing.
- 2 Health/Hauora Education at Central Normal School/Te Kura Tuatahi o Papaioea will be delivered in alignment with the New Zealand Curriculum and Te Marautanga o Aotearoa.
 - The Health and Physical Education/Hauora Learning Area is underpinned by four key concepts that consider overall wellbeing, interactions between people and society, the need for healthy communities and health-enhancing attitudes and values.
 - Central Normal School/Te Kura Tuatahi o Papaioea kaiako will use a range of teaching approaches and learning contexts to develop learners' understanding of these concepts of Health/Hauora Education and aim to equip learners with the skills needed to enable them to make health-enhancing life choices.
 - Units of Learning will be regularly reviewed in order to ensure that our Health Education programme is meeting the learning needs of our tamariki and reflects best practice in Health/Hauora Education.
